

Forestry Graduates at UBC To Wear Colors of Free Hungary

The colors of a free Hungary will be added to graduation ceremonies at the University of British Columbia in May.

The graduating class of the Sopron faculty of forestry, which was transplanted to UBC last September, will wear the red and white of free Hungary on their graduating dress.

Twenty-eight of the 194 Hungarian forestry students are now taking their final examinations. They will

graduate in the same way and at the same ceremony as other UBC students.

But at their graduation "hoods"—an apron-like affair that fits over the shoulders—will be something special.

The 25 regular UBC forestry graduates will wear hoods with a brown lining and green stripe on the front, the colors of the faculty. The Sopron graduates will also have red and white stripes alongside the green.

Their diplomas will read

Bachelor of Science in Forestry, with the words "Equivalent to graduate forest engineer (Okleveles Erdomernok) from Sopron University, Hungary," added.

The graduates will probably go to work in sawmills and logging camps learning the B.C. business from the ground up.
